Insure Your Art and Your Studio


On May 1, Windward Artists Guild invited Mr. Earl N Hisatomi, Vice-President of Hawaii Insurance Consultants, Ltd. to share some ideas about insuring our art work. Here are some messages from the talk, although one must obviously discuss specifics with their insurance agent.

- If an artist has art works in his/her home and they are not for sale, the homeowner's insurance will cover it. It is up to the homeowner to establish value by presenting prices for comparable works of art. It is recommended to take pictures and keep lists of room contents. The insurance company may require an appraisal for valuable items. It is a good idea to keep receipts for purchases of art; this would not establish increase in value.
- If an artist sells art from his/her home, or from a gallery or an exhibit, the artist needs business insurance to cover property damage or loss. If you create art at home to sell anywhere, your studio is a business and may not be covered by your homeowner's (including umbrella) policy.
- Windward Artists Guild insurance covers liability for injury to persons involved with and attending an exhibition. It does not cover damage to or loss of displayed art. This is true of most non-profit organizations that sponsor exhibitions here in Hawaii. That is why artists must sign a waiver when they enter exhibitions.
